
The group of 16 youths and four adult chaperones pulled out of a parking lot full of parents, friends and well wishers from St. Michael's after Father Kevin

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She said the event is expected to draw around 1 million youths from around the world.

The group will camp three nights on the way to Toronto and two nights on the way back, with a stop at Niagra Falls.

The highlight of the event will be a papal mass celebrated on July 28, Brandenburg said.

The teen-agers have been preparing for the trip for two years. Preparations included painting the bus; orange and yellow flames stream from the wheelwells, and a blue silhouette of the pope is painted on the side.

A passenger van carrying the travelers' gear as well as tools and repair items will follow the bus.

The group from St. Michael's is the largest from Arkansas, Brandenburg said. The youths will also meet with Bishop of Little Rock Peter Sartain.
